Weeping Becomes A River – Siphokazi Jonas



On the eve of the multi-award-winning writer, performer and poet Siphokazi Jonas' forthcoming debut, Penguin Random House poetry collection, *Weeping Becomes a River*, released in September 2024, the latter part of 2024, into 2025 looks to be an eventful and confirmatory career trajectory for the firebrand.

Siphokazi Jonas is a weaver of seemingly discordant worlds; growing up in an Afrikaans dorpie, attending an English boarding school, and going on annual holidays to a village, *emaxhoseni*, during the transition years of South


Africa's democracy made this a necessity.

In *Weeping Becomes a River*, she confronts the linguistic and cultural alienation experienced as a black learner in former Model C schools in the 1990s and early 2000s. Then, she fashions the fragments to reclaim and rewrite her place within a lineage of storytellers.

Migrating between forms, poetry and *intsomi*, she navigates the waters of tradition, religion, intergenerational experiences of rural and urban spaces, and how family dynamics affect the body. She is not only a referee of the

raging tensions within her but also pieces together a language for pathways of leaving and returning.

Her poems grapple with the past, the present, and possible futures without forgetting that “the body is marked territory from birth, and the scent of it never leaves”. Endorsements as to her talent and ongoing contribution to the literary arts are multiform. Still, one of the most significant is that written by the esteemed film score composer ([Trevor Jones](#) in the foreword to *Weeping Becomes a River*.



“Her writing has an underlying political relevance, not only as a commentary on the politics of South Africa and her ethnicity but also as an eagerness to address and redress the gender balance. In this work, she juxtaposes a

mythic story with poems, creating an intriguing world through this unusual narrative form, conjuring up new experiences and realities and triggering ideas that resonate in the reader’s mind.

“I would encourage those curious to allow themselves to journey with her into a world where she conjures up unfamiliar experiences and creates captivating realities imbued with fascination and intrigue. In her word paintings of a world with all its attendant emotions, she crafts languages to convey tangible and intangible ideas. The unfamiliar becomes familiar as her choice of words and their relevance creates a unique form of poetry redolent with meaning, atmosphere and depth of emotion.”

The months ahead are alive with the opportunity to engage with *Weeping Becomes a River* and the author as she embarks on a book tour that will take her across South Africa and around the world. For starters, come September, [The Open Book Festival](#) looks forward to welcoming Siphokazi back to host as part of their annual literature celebration. Between the 6th and 8th of September, poetry lovers and those curious to embrace original creative writing that speaks to a South African reality and a global audience keen to understand the power of prose better come together at this imperative *imbizo*.

After the success of [#WeAreDyingHere](#), and as her first official engagement in celebration of only the second poetry book to be published by Penguin Random House in South Africa, patrons will get the opportunity to hear from the

author herself and enjoy a selection of works that make up this gripping collection.



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At 40, Nonkululeko Ngubeni has worked hard to climb the corporate ladder and now has it all – a good job as a sought-after Chartered Accountant, the house, her dream car, a healthy bank balance – and a controlling mother who bleeds her dry every chance she gets. She doesn't mind the black tax; other than her mother, she has five siblings who depend on her, four of them already

at college. After all, it is her mother, Rebecca, who bent over backwards to ensure that she reaches this pinnacle in her life. Only if she would stop reminding her of that fact every time her purse starts to weigh a little lighter.

Nonkululeko's life takes a dramatic turn when a new junior employee, Mandla Masuku, shows a romantic interest in her. She has just come out of a tumultuous relationship with a colleague, whose wondering eye led him to date her best friend. Now, the prospect of dating a man almost half her age seems like a rebound that would raise eyebrows, and possibly put paid to a career she has worked hard for all her life. As if that is not enough, a revelation about how her father died over three and a half decades ago, threatens to tear the already thin fabric holding the relationship she has with her mother.

Beneath Her Skin, from the quill of Sukoluhle Nontokozo Mdlongwa, shines the spotlight on the often strained mother-daughter relationships, black tax, romance between an older woman and a younger man, and how family dynamics can drive a caring breadwinner to depression.

Fertility: The Measure Of A Woman's Worth



Where a woman's worth is measured by her fertility, childbearing abilities are the passport to praise and approval.

This is the logline of BARE, a documentary by Monica Bila, which won the Women Behind Film Award, at

the Mpumalanga International Film Festival.

Written and directed by Monica Bila, and produced by Burgundy Lights Media and Production House, BARE seeks to give a voice to women who are unable to have children biologically. The awards were held at the iLanga Mall Cinema in Mbombela on August 10th, 2024.

BARE is a story about giving a voice to women who are unable to have children biologically, by sharing 38-year-old community development practitioner, Yvonne Masondo's story, and shining the spotlight on both societal double standards around it as well as exploring the causes for it (medically and spiritually).

Mrs Yvonne Masondo is a married professional career woman from Middelburg, in Mpumalanga, who has challenges in her attempts to conceive, due to medical and possibly spiritual reasons. She grew up in a big family in the small town of Dundonald “Dondon” in Mpumalanga. She is her parent's only daughter, out of seven boys, which inspired her deep desire for a big family.

At 22, Yvonne fell pregnant from her then relationship and had her daughter out of wedlock. After her relationship with her daughter's father ended, she decided to move back to Middelburg to pursue a career in community development and politics.

In 2015, Yvonne met and fell in love with her husband through a social

media platform, and they decided to start a family. After trying to conceive on their own unsuccessfully for a year, Yvonne and her husband decided to seek medical help. Even after the doctors tested them and did procedures on Yvonne, the couple still couldn't conceive, so they sought the help of preachers, herbalists, prophets and so forth, in a bid to fall pregnant. Yet, it was all in vain.


Years later, the couple still have not been able to hear the cry of their own child. Meanwhile, the pressure of the biological clock weighed heavily on Yvonne's shoulders, but she refuses to give up.

This story may seem like an isolated event, however Mrs Yvonne Masondo represents so many women and men in the world who are unable to bring their dream of having one or more children to fruition. The subject or topic of infertility is introduced in depth as well as the causes according to the professionals – gynecology specialist Dr. K.T Maoto and Family Physician Dr. S.D Mogano.

Some people believe in the spirituality and/or religious aspects of life, and this part is covered by traditional healer, Mr. P. Zitha, Pastor F.D Mabhena as well as Apostle E.S Nkosi. The professionals (Traditional and Western) share their opinions and personal experiences on infertility, how they believe it can be treated or cured (where possible) and Yvonne shows off her resilience as a woman of faith.

22 Scribes Get Opportunity To Publish



A total of 22 aspiring writers will get an opportunity to get published, thanks to **PUBLISH'D AFRIKA Magazine's Adopt-An-Author Program**.

Of the 22, a total of 16 writers will form part of **PUBLISH'D AFRIKA Magazine's** Spoiling The Broth Volume 3, while six scribes will publish individual, complete bodies of work.

Each year, **PUBLISH'D AFRIKA Online Literary Magazine** sponsors the editing, proofreading, manuscript development and ultimately publication of aspiring authors' works, at no cost to them. These are aspiring authors that we identify independently, whose works in our opinion stand out and show promise. The authors also have to be willing to be mentored further on the craft.

The **PUBLISH'D AFRIKA's Adopt-An-Author Program** was established in 2021, with the publication of, amongst others, Zeripah Amoni Phiri's book, *I Am Also A Woman*. The project was wholly funded by Mr Success Moripa, of Moripe Group of Companies. The project gained momentum with the publication of Matumelo Mafoko's book, *Through The Silent Tsunami*. Matumelo's project was funded by **PUBLISH'D AFRIKA**.

Anathi Kom's poetry anthology, *A Tree of Life*, soon followed. This was a collaboration between **PUBLISH'D AFRIKA** and the University of Fort Hare. Anathi has gone on to

make a name for herself, also becoming a contributor to **PUBLISH'D AFRIKA Magazine's Spoiling The Broth anthology Vol1.**

Below are six of the authors who have been selected to be part of the **2024 PUBLISH'D AFRIKA's Adopt-An-Author Program:**

Ndinisa Asiphe, a 19-year-old second-year University of Fort Hare student pursuing studies in the LLB stream. She was born in Butterworth and bred in Fort Malan, a rural area in kuGatyana called Ntshatshongo.



Ndinisa started writing at a very young age. Her first published work about bullying was published in the YAKHA Magazine in 2021, when she was in Grade 11. This year, she entered a competition called Cape Argus Youth Competition, of which the results are yet to be published. She also entered a GBV and Consent Competition sponsored by the University of Fort Hare.

Her book, *I Rise Like A Phoenix*, clinched her the **PUBLISH'D AFRIKA Adopt-An-Author** accolade.

"I am grateful for the opportunity that **PUBLISH'D AFRIKA** is giving us as upcoming authors," she said. "May the hands that keep blessing us receive everlasting joy and encouragement to do so, and may they be rewarded for their splendid work."

Sanelisiwe Ndlovu is a 34-year-old fiction author born in Gwanda, Zimbabwe, but currently based in Nelspruit, Mpumalanga. She mostly specialises in romance, fantasy and young adult.




With a passion of storytelling and a knack for humour, she has penned three books on Visionary Writings that inspire

and delight readers, namely *The Scorned Woman*, *The Appeasement*, and *Broken Mirror*. She also runs a Facebook page 'Stories by Sane Ndlovu' that was established in February 2024 and has now garnered more than five thousand followers. This is where she shares engaging stories and fosters a community of like-minded readers.

Through her writing, Sanelisiwe aims to transport readers to new dimensions and spark meaningful conversations. She also aims to delight and entertain readers of all ages through her unique voice and perspective.

Vuyo Walter Mayo is a 26-year-old from Kanana, near the city of Klerksdorp, in the North West province.



After matric, Vuyo enrolled at Boston City Campus, but unfortunately couldn't carry on through to the second semester

due to financial difficulties. With no clue of what to do next, he took the decision to take his gift of literature seriously.

"I had an awareness since primary school that I had a way with words, and could possibly try to earn a living doing that," he said. "I wrote my first adult fiction book, but unfortunately never was able to get it published. I later on decided to use my gift of words in other areas to expand my horizons, and tried my hand in music, in the genre of Hip-Hop. I followed through on that decision and actually became good at it, so good that I got the opportunity to work with a well-known artist named Maglera Doe Boy in 2023. I have since then been doing music."

Vuyo's book, titled *How I Got Over My Trauma Of Being Cheated On*, is inspired by spirituality and self-healing. His ability to heal himself from certain experiences through meditation inspired him to write this book so he could be of service to other individuals who find themselves dealing with the same hurt and trauma.

Katlego Remelda Leboho is a romance author known for her heartwarming stories that explore the complexities of human relationships and the power of love to transform lives.

Born and raised in the Limpopo province (Blouberg), Katlego grew up with a love for books and a passion for storytelling. She began writing her first novel in high school and never looked back. Her writing is characterised by its lyrical prose, relatable characters, and a

poignant exploration of themes such as grief, loss and redemption.



Her books have been praised for their emotional depth, authentic characters, and engaging storylines that keep readers hooked until the very end. She has won the 2023 Best Adult author for Book Behind Awards, Best poetry took 2022 (Mia Academy) and has been a featured author on Alkebulan Authors platform magazine (Malawi).

Lazarus Kgageng is a South African Queer author, from Limpopo Province. His passion for writing stems from his high school years. It afforded him an opportunity to be trained as a screenwriter by Ayanda Halimana and Mmabatho Kau in 2019.




Lazarus debuted as an author when his first queer short story titled *Moving Sands* was published in an anthology titled *Something in The Water* in 2022. His second publication was titled *Fallen Leaves* featured in The Muse Journal Issue 50 in 2023.

Lazarus obtained a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Political and International Studies as well as Legal Theory in 2022. At the end of 2023, Lazarus obtained his Bachelor of Arts Degree with Honours in Political and International Studies. Both degrees were obtained from Rhodes University, in South Africa.

Lazarus Kgageng is also the founding director of a youth and community development organisation known as Thola Lesedi, which he founded in 2016. From his projects, he was announced as a finalist for the 2021 Top 200 Mail and Guardian Young South Africans under the category of Education and has been awarded several awards for student leadership from Rhodes University.

Alfred Morudu is an aspiring author, a visual artist and speaker.



He has done a number of self-help courses, where he learned about

personalities and setting goals. Through that phase of learning, he realised that sometimes we need to be intentional about the change we need.

“My aspiration is to be the agent of change to the community around me,” he said. “My vision is to help people psychologically to be free from any destructive mind, to help them achieve formed mind. My goal is to write more self-help books that can transform our society from the matrix and be the inspiration that they can look up to.”

The **PUBLISH'D AFRIKA Magazine's Spoiling The Broth Volume 3** boasts of the talents of 16 scribes from South Africa, Mozambique, Kenya, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

Being Fully Present



How do we celebrate Women's Month in a country where gender-based violence is so prevalent? What role can poetry play in that celebration?

To explore these burning questions, the AVBOB Poetry Project sat down with Qhali, a poet, editor and social justice activist whose debut poetry collection, "Crying in My Mother's Tongue" (Ukulila) was published by Akashic Records and the African Poetry Book Fund this year.

"As a child, whenever I was hurt, I imagined my mother was the safest place on earth," she explains. "When I

experienced violation of my body, I literally wanted to return into her body. Later, when my first child was born, I felt immense joy and the need to keep her safe inside that joy. But she had to leave my belly to experience what she came here for – joy and sorrow.

"The isiXhosa phrase in the title reflects another way in which I want to cry inside my mother, which is to cry in her tongue, in her language, in the first rhythms I heard."

Qhali's raw, honest exploration of gender-based violence has led to the

creation of an extraordinary, multilingual project.

“Loss-i-Lahleko – A National Choreopoem is a multilingual anthology and survival guide that has been translated into 11 books in all official [written] South African languages, as well as an audiobook. It is currently out at some Exclusive Books stores, and I hope it will become more widely accessible. Everyone should have the right to mourn, relate and heal in their own language.”

One of her most moving poems, ‘Return to Tsolobeng’, explores the need for self-care in order to nurture others. It features a mother who takes a long journey into the mountains, temporarily entrusting her two young children into her own mother’s care for the sake of her mental well-being:

“Sometimes a mother needs to return home to be a mother

Because sometimes this place can make you forget

How to be a human,

How to feed a child and be nowhere else...”

Qhali remembers, “I had lost my mind. That is how this poem came about. I had just left a well-paying job for poetry, hoping it would save me. I was lying in bed in my mother’s house with my two children in my arms. I didn’t know what

to do next. Then a text message from a former supervisor came through, encouraging me to enter a poem for a competition. And so I wrote it, without putting my pen down. Afterwards, I read it and knew exactly what I was going to do with my life. I no longer cared about the competition. I had just found my plan to keep me here. So this is what I would like readers to bear in mind: You can save yourself, rebirth yourself, over and over, just as your mother did once.”

When asked what practices and rituals most deeply nourish her writing, Qhali shares, “I employ a few practices and rituals before I write, even if I feel the poem is ready to be written. I walk barefoot outdoors for some time, place my body in water (a bath or the ocean), or speak to my ancestors before sitting in silence with them. Often, I bring gifts with me, including water and light. In order to write, I need to be completely alone and yet somehow feel held by them.”

“Shattered Dreams” Doccie Wins Big!



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“Shattered Dreams”, a poignant documentary film detailing the struggles of artists who have been left to fend for themselves in a world determined to stifle their creativity, has emerged as one of the winners in the Best Documentary category, at the Mpumalanga International Film Festival.

Written and directed by Given Boleu, and produced by the Middelburg-based production company 1050 STATE (PTY)

LTD, *Shattered Dreams* shared the award with *Rhino Man* and *Freedom Flyer* in the Best Documentary category. The awards were held at the iLanga Mall Cinema in Mbombela on August 10th, 2024.

Shattered Dreams tells a tale as old as time - talented individuals with big dreams, left to wither away due to a lack of support. It sheds light on the heartbreaking reality faced by many in the arts – poets, musicians, singers,

actors, and creatives of all kinds, whose God-given talents were never given the chance to flourish.



The doccie details how such dreams never take off or materialise due to the lack of moral support from family and the government's inability to come up with structured programs for art and culture, sports and recreation, to make sure young people live off their talents.

Given told **PUBLISH'D AFRIKA**: "The documentary is about talented musicians, rappers, poets, and just about anyone practising the arts. In the film, local artists in different disciplines introduce themselves and share their stories about the struggles of the arts specifically in Middelburg, the experience of being artists in a town surrounded by plenty of mines, and where art is less favoured and

appreciated but needed. Instead of talent being uplifted, it seems like a curse because a lot of artists end up wasting talent by being trapped in things that they are not passionate about, due to pressure to provide for themselves and their families just for survival. While they have talent, they are trapped behind the tills at retail stores, petrol stations and mines."

The documentary also exposes how little the government is doing to make sure that art is encouraged, supported and appreciated just like mathematics and science, so that kids that want to pursue and practise the arts can do so.

The film takes a raw and unflinching look at the struggles of these artists. But "Shattered Dreams" is more than just a lament - it's a call to action. For a permanent art platform for local artists to live off their talents, to make a living from their passion. The film is a testament to the human spirit, which continues to create, even in the face of adversity.

And it was this powerful message that resonated with the judges at the Mpumalanga International Film Festival. It was a moment of triumph, not just for the filmmakers, but for the talented individuals who shared their stories, their struggles, and their shattered dreams.

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
Siyafunda Sonke

social interaction and intellectual discussion.



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


Commonwealth Short Story Prize 2024

The 2025 Commonwealth Short Story Prize will open for entries from 1 September 2024 to 1 November 2024.

The prize is free to enter and open to any citizen of a Commonwealth country aged 18 and over. It is awarded for the best piece of unpublished short fiction (2,000–5,000 words).

Submissions should be made via the online entry form which will be available on this page from 1 September.

An international judging panel of writers will select a shortlist of around twenty stories, from which five regional winners are chosen. One of the regional winners is then selected as the overall winner, who receives £5,000. The regional winners will receive £2,500. All five regional winning stories will be published on Granta.

Who is eligible to submit?

The prize is open to all Commonwealth citizens aged 18 and over.

What do the winning writers receive?

The regional winners receive £2,500 and the overall winner receives a total of £5,000. The winning stories are published online by Granta and in a special print collection by Paper + Ink. The shortlisted stories are published in adda, the online literary magazine of the Commonwealth Foundation.

If the winning short story is a translation into English, the translator will receive an additional prize of £750.

What is the word limit?

The story must be between 2,000 and 5,000 words.

Is there any required theme or genre?

The prize is only open to short fiction, but it can be in any fiction genre—science fiction, speculative fiction, historical fiction, crime, romance, literary fiction—and you may write about any subject you wish.

In what languages do you accept entries?

We accept stories written in Bengali, Chinese, Creole, English, French, Greek, Malay, Maltese, Portuguese, Samoan, Swahili, Tamil, and Turkish. Stories that have been translated into English from any language are also accepted and the translator of any winning story receives additional prize money.

Can I enter a story I have previously submitted?

You cannot enter a story you have submitted in previous years.

Can the story be published?

Your submission must be unpublished in any print or online publication, with the exception of personal websites.

How is the prize judged?

Entries are initially assessed by a team of readers and a longlist of 200 entries is put before the international judging panel, comprising a chair and five judges, one from each

of the Commonwealth regions – Africa, Asia, Canada and Europe, the Caribbean, and the Pacific. All judges read entries from all regions.

Entries in other languages are assessed by relevant language readers and the best submissions are selected for translation into English to be considered for inclusion on the longlist.

The judging panel select a shortlist of around twenty stories, from which five regional winners are chosen, one of which is chosen as the overall winner.

When do submissions open and close?

Entries open from 1 September 2024 – 1 November 2024.

The other key dates for the prize are as follows:

April 2025: Shortlist revealed

May 2025: Regional winners announced

June 2025: Award ceremony and overall winner announced


